Elizabeth Kolbert writes on politics and on global warming. Her article has to do with the tough choices involved in reclaiming delta land from inevitable flooding. Notice especially the kinds of evidence she presents, and the way she approaches the tough questions: does she make them clear? What does she want her readers to think or do?
