```

Just as a horror movie keeps you on the edge of your seat, **so** chemistry class keeps you wide awake and terrified.

(<u>Iust as</u> + sentence about noun X, <u>so</u> + sentence about noun Y)

Attending that class **is like/similar to** meeting an old girlfriend **in that** both experiences start out comfortably but wind up being difficult.

(Noun X is like noun Y in that both. . . .)
