"Markets & Moral Desert"

Selections from "A Theory of Justice" by John Rawls.

- (1) What are the common sense precepts of justice?
- (2) "None of these precepts can plausibly be raised to a first principle. ... Adopting one of them as a first principle is sure to lead to the neglect of other things that should be taken into account." Explain, using examples.
- (3) Different economic systems, governed by different principles of justice, would in practice assign different *weights* to each of the common sense precepts of justice. Illustrate, using examples.
- (4) Rawls thinks that his principles of justice would give the *right* weight to *each* common sense precept ("to each according to his contribution," "to each according to his need," and "to each according to his effort"). Do you agree?

Recall that the difference principle *does* allow giving greater rewards to more talented and hard-working people, but *only* to the extent that this improves the prospects of the least advantaged.

- (i) Why don't people with scarce talents deserve to be rewarded for their *unique contributions* even more generously than the difference principle would allow?
- (ii) Why don't the more talented deserve even greater rewards if they are willing to put in more *effort* than less talented people?

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
