The following are extra sources for problems:

- The website for *Microeconomics* by Pindyck & Rubinfeld on Prentice Hall (www.prenhall.com/pindyck) provides a set of problems with solutions (in multiple choice format). Click on 'student resources' and then on the title of the chapter you're interested in.
- The *Study Guide* by Suslow and Hamilton that goes with *Microeconomics* by Pindyck and Rubinfeld contains for each chapter about 30 solved problems. It also contains short reviews. According to Amazon.com, it ships within 24 hours.

A more basic introduction to microeconomics that many people like is *Microeconomics* by Nordhaus and Samuelson. (Note that the authors also have books *Economics* and *Macroeconomics*. The *Economics* book is just a bundling of the two others).

Some students also liked *The Instant Economist* by Pool and Laroe as a very informal introduction to the ideas of economics. (Note that a large part of this small book is actually about macroeconomics, which is not covered in this course.)
